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1 PURPOSE

- 1.1 To inform members of the Council's statutory responsibilities under the Government's counter terrorism strategy 'Contest' and particularly under the 'Prevent' strand of that strategy.
- 1.2 To recommend to Members actions the Council should take as part of its statutory responsibilities under Prevent.
- 1.3 Relevance to the Council's ambitions and priorities:
 - Community Objectives The Council's statutory obligations under 'Prevent' should be viewed as an extension of its safeguarding responsibilities. We are required to identify those at risk of radicalisation and protect them.
 - Corporate Priorities This is a statutory responsibility and the Council therefore must respond. As a minimum we must assess risk and prepare an appropriate action plan based on that risk.
 - Other Considerations None identified.

2 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 Contest is the government's strategy to counter terrorism. It is split into four parts:
 - Pursue: to stop terrorist attacks.
 - Prevent: to stop people becoming terrorists or supporting terrorism.
 - Protect: to strengthen our protection against a terrorist attack.
 - Prepare: to mitigate the impact of a terrorist attack.
- 2.2 **Prevent** operates in the pre-criminal space and local authorities have a statutory responsibility to assess the risk of radicalisation in their area and prepare an action plan accordingly. This should not place any additional burden on the day to day activities of the council as it should form part of their safeguarding procedures; however there may be some initial effort in establishing processes.
- 2.3 It is important to be aware that there are proposals to rebrand **Prevent** to **Engage** in an attempt to improve the image of the programme.

2.4 **Definitions**

Extremism

The government has defined extremism as:

"vocal or active opposition to fundamental British values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs. We also include in our definition of extremism calls for the death of members of our armed forces."

Extremism includes:

- International terrorism (this includes Islamist extremism) current threat level is severe;
- Northern Ireland related current threat level is substantial;
- Domestic Extremism (this includes extreme right-wing) this poses a threat to public order, not national security.

Terrorism

Extremist groups become terrorist groups when they use violence or threats of violence to publicise their causes and as a means to achieve their goals. They often aim to influence or exert pressure on governments and government policies but reject democratic processes, or even democracy itself.

Extremist groups may still be legal, however some may be proscribed if the Home Secretary believes it is concerned in terrorism and it is proportionate to do so. This is when the organisation:

- commits or participates in acts of terrorism;
- prepares for terrorism;
- promotes or encourages terrorism (including the unlawful glorification of terrorism);
- is otherwise concerned in terrorism.

Radicalisation

Radicalisation is a process by which an individual or group comes to adopt increasingly extreme political, social, or religious ideals and aspirations.

Terrorist groups will radicalise and therefore recruit (often vulnerable) people through use of extremist ideology. The government Prevent strategy which this report covers, aims to prevent radicalisation.

It is important to note that not all members of terrorist groups participate in violence but may be supporting the violent acts of the terrorist group.

3 ISSUES

3.1 Under statutory guidance (available to view here https://www.gov.uk/government/uploads/system/uploads/attachment_data/file/44597 Totalian Valley is required to assess the risk of terrorism in its area. All Lancashire district councils including Ribble Valley are classed as Tier 3 (low risk) with the exception of Blackburn and Burnley which are Tier 2 (medium risk).

- 3.2 Although Ribble Valley is low risk, we are still required to assess the risk and use this assessment to prepare an action plan. The action plan will ensure we are able to respond appropriately if an individual is found to be at risk of radicalisation. Radicalisation is non-geographical and can happen anywhere, including over the internet.
- 3.3 The Council is responsible for ensuring its staff can recognise the signs of a vulnerable person being radicalised under its safeguarding procedures and if needed and refer them to 'Channel'. Channel is a multi-agency panel that discusses individual cases of potential radicalisation and puts in place a 'Prevent Case Management Plan' to counteract that radicalisation.
- 3.4 Lancashire County Council has prepared a Prevent delivery plan which includes recommendations to local authorities in preparing their own response to the Prevent agenda. This document has been taken into account in the preparation of the Ribble Valley risk assessment and action plan.
- 3.5 Officers have considered the risks relevant to Ribble Valley and in accordance with our statutory duty have produced an assessment of the risk to individuals in its area being radicalised. This risk assessment has been used to inform an action plan, which is attached at Appendix 1.
- 3.6 The action plan will ensure staff and stakeholders are able to respond to suspicions of radicalisation and make appropriate referrals to Channel.

4 RISK ASSESSMENT

- 4.1 The approval of this report may have the following implications:
 - Resources Some officer time will be spent initially on the actions related to Prevent, such as reviewing policy and undertaking awareness raising sessions.
 Ongoing Lancashire-wide meetings will be attended by officers to ensure joint working but after the initial implementation very little additional work would be created.
 - Technical, Environmental and Legal None identified.
 - Political This is a statutory responsibility and therefore we need to be seen as taking appropriate actions as part of Prevent.
 - Reputation This is a statutory responsibility and it is possible action would be taken if we do not respond, therefore damaging the Council's reputation.
 - Equality & Diversity There is some tension in the BME community around the Prevent agenda and therefore it does need to be handled sensitively. However Ribble Valley is a low risk area so the actions in relation to Prevent are not invasive ones and primarily focus around ensuring the Council and its staff are suitably aware of Prevent and are able to spot signs of radicalisation as part of their general safeguarding responsibilities.

5 **RECOMMENDED THAT COMMITTEE**

5.1 Agree the actions contained within the attached action plan.
