1 PURPOSE

- 4 BUSINESS RATES REVALUATION 2017 AND THE GOVERNMENT'S CONSULTATION ON TRANSITIONAL ARRANGEMENTS
- 4.1 A report was taken to the Budget Working Group on 12 October 2016 outlining the impact of Revaluation 2017 and the Government's consultation on transitional arrangements.
- 4.2 Budget Working Group requested that a response be sent to the consultation supporting option 2 on the grounds that more medium sized businesses will benefit from reductions in rates sooner than option 1.

- 6 HOUSING BENEFIT AND COUNCIL TAX SUPPORT PERFORMANCE
- 6.1 The main indicator for Housing Benefit and Council Tax Support performance is known as Right Time. The benefit section also report on Local Performance Indicators that have been set within the department for benefit fraud and overpayments.
- 6.2 The Department for Work and Pensions does not require Local Authorities (LA's) to report on any other Performance Measures but encourages them to monitor their own performance locally.
- 6.3 We obviously consider it very important to monitor benefit fraud and also overpayment data.

Housing Benefit Right Time Indicator 2016/2017

The right time indicator measures the time taken to process HB/CTS new claims and change events; this includes changes in circumstances, interventions, fraud referrals and prints generated by the benefit department.
